



**OCHA Field Situation Report 5  
Indonesia – Earthquake  
West Java – Central Java Provinces  
21 July 2006, 17:30**

This report is developed by HC/RC Office in Indonesia based on information provided by the Meteorology and Geophysics Agency (BMG), National Coordination Board for Disaster Management (BAKORNAS PB), Provincial Coordinating Unit for Disaster Management (SATKORLAK PB) West Java, Priangan Coordination Board (BAKORWIL Priangan), Ministry of Social Affairs, Ministry of Health (MOH), IFRC, Indonesian Red Cross (PMI), Inter-Agency Assessment Team Jakarta and Yogyakarta, and media reports.

**I. SITUATION**

1. According to the National Coordination Board for Disaster Management (BAKORNAS PB), the death toll stands at 533 dead, 952 injured, 308 missing. Verification of data is still on going and some duplication for dead persons has been reported. The breakdown of the figures is as the following:

Some double counting on figures has been reported on the number of dead people. This figure has been revised by BAKORNAS PB.

2. The national media reported today that the total number of IDPs amounts to 61,352, located in Ciamis (43,759), Tasikmalaya (12,025), Cilacap (4,300) and Kebumen (1,268) districts. High figures continue to be reported for displaced population and are still fluctuating, associated with the fear and trauma that people are undergoing.
3. Based on preliminary information provided by BAKORNAS PB, the recent earthquake and Tsunami have caused the following damages:
  - West Java
    - Ciamis District
      - Houses: 703 destroyed/heavily damaged and 75 slightly damaged
      - Schools: 2 destroyed/heavily damaged and one slightly damaged
      - Hotels/Lodgings: 346 destroyed/heavily damaged
      - Fishermen's boats: 1,176 units destroyed
      - Roads: 11,700 m heavily damaged and 8,500m slightly damaged
      - Bridges: 5 destroyed/heavily damaged and 3 slightly damaged
      - Prayers sites: 12 destroyed/heavily damaged and 3 slightly damaged
      - Health Post (Puskesmas): one destroyed/heavily damaged
      - Government Offices: 42 destroyed/heavily damaged
      - Paddy Fields: 110 hectares damaged
      - Field/Plantations: 27 hectares damaged
    - Tasikmalaya District
      - Houses: 375 destroyed/heavily damaged, 31 slightly damaged
      - Health Post (Puskesmas Pembantu): one damaged
    - Garut District
      - Houses: two destroyed/heavily damaged, 4 slightly damaged
  - Central Java
    - Cilacap District:
      - 65 buildings/houses and two fishermen boats damaged
    - Kebumen District:
      - Houses: 18 heavily damaged
      - Stalls: 103 destroyed/heavily damaged
      - Fishermen's Boats: 474 swept away/heavily damaged and 132 slightly damaged
    - Purworejo District:
      - Fishermen's Boats: 90 damaged
4. IFRC/PMI reported that family livelihoods have been disrupted in the affected area, especially those whose income generates from activities in the tourism sector, as they mostly lost their shops, restaurants, hotels/lodgings, etc. Pangandaran beach and other tourism places nearby have been temporarily closed.
5. IFRC/PMI also reported that in Banjar Hospital, Ciamis District, there are about 150 persons suffering from fracture and respiratory problems who have been hospitalized in facilities with operational limitations. One amputation has been done and to date, orthopaedic teams from neighboring hospitals have been mobilized.
6. Based on initial findings from PMI's field assessment, the number of IDPs still largely fluctuates and most live in shelters with limited facilities. Shelters are full even though most houses have not sustained damage. IDPs interviewed still express clear reluctance to return home due to fear and trauma.

## II. NATIONAL RESPONSE

7. On Friday 21 July, the President of Indonesia visited the affected areas in Ciamis District and provided some emergency relief assistance (not specified the kind of assistance).
8. SAR Teams continue to evacuate and search the missing victims. Unidentified corpses have been buried in mass burials in Pangandaran, Ciamis District.
9. Local authorities continue to provide temporary shelters, public kitchens, health services, and to distribute food and non food items to the affected population.
10. PMI has provided ready-to-eat food to IDPs in nine shelters. PMI will also continue to provide food to the affected communities/IDPs shelters for the next ten days, as an exit strategy before passing it on to local government. PMI is also undertaking activities related with “restoring family links” for those who have been separated from their families. PMI is also helping in identifying corpses found, in close coordination with local hospitals.
11. The Chairman of Indonesian Red Cross (PMI), the PMI Secretary General, and the IFRC Deputy Head visited the affected area today.

### **III. INTERNATIONAL RESPONSE**

12. A WHO consultant in cooperation with MOH, Provincial Health Office (PHO) and District Health Office (DHO) will visit the affected areas from 21 to 25 July 2006 to facilitate the process of strengthening the emergency information and supply system management. WHO will help PHO/DHO in providing Anti Tetanus Serum (ATS), and Tetanus Toxoid (TT) for the injured IDPs.
